

Unified Planning Work Program FY24 Available for Comment

Springtime in New Orleans is here! The smell of crawfish boils floats on the breeze, Mardi Gras Indians march through neighborhood streets, festivals fill our calendars and, of course, RPC's Unified Planning Work Program for the state fiscal year is finalized.

Ah, the Unified Planning Work Program. For those unfamiliar with this beloved annual tradition might be asking: what? Simply put, the Unified Planning Work Program (UPWP) describes all of the federally funded transportation planning activities that a Metropolitan Planning Organization will conduct and the planning products that will be created in Louisiana's fiscal year (this time that's July 1, 2023 to June 30, 2024). Think of it as a narrative of the work we are committing to do in the upcoming year, why we are doing it, who is going to do it, and how we are going to pay for it. It's where all of the goals and ideas



described in our long range Metropolitan Transportation Plan turn into action.

And right now you have a chance to take a look it before it's finished. The draft UPWP for fiscal year 2024 is currently up for review on the RPC website, and will be until May 9th. So pull up a lawn chair under an azalea tree, wipe the orange seasoning off your fingers, and dig in.

New Orleans East I-10 Service Road Pedestrian Safety Study



In January RPC kicked off a study that will explore ways to make the service roads of I-10 in New Orleans East safer for all travelers. Both RPC and the City of New Orleans have identified the Interstate as a substantial barrier for non-motorized travel in the surrounding communities, and a history of crashes demonstrates that the service roads

are far too dangerous for pedestrians and bicyclists.

RPC's study will first examine existing conditions on the both the north and south service roads between Dwyer and Paris Roads. How many motorists, pedestrians, and bicyclists are currently using the services roads, and what days and times of day are they most heavily used? How fast are cars going? Where are crashes taking place, and how are they happening? What's the condition of the road itself, and the lighting on the road? Planners will collect extensive data to answer these questions, and will also reach out the community itself, to hear from residents about their own experiences with the service roads.

With these data and personal accounts, the study will make recommendations toward making the service roads safer for non-motorized road users. These recommendations will focus on protected bike and walkways that are uninterrupted along the length of the corridor, and that connect to the surrounding bicycle and pedestrian network. The study will also look at ways to make crossing the service roads and potentially the interstate itself safer, and explore how to calm traffic where speeding is identified as a constant issue.

RPC Awarded Safe Streets For All Grant


On January 30, the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) announced the Regional Planning Commission received a \$820,000 grant for the creation of a regional safety action plan as part of the Safe Streets and Roads for All program, a new discretionary program created by the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act to fund regional local and tribal initiatives through grants to prevent roadway deaths and serious injuries. RPC's application was for the development of a regional action plan for the parishes of St. John the Baptist. Tangipahoa, and St. Tammany. With the support of this grant, the Regional Planning Commission will develop a comprehensive action plan addressing the root causes of unsafe streets and



propose evidence-based infrastructure and behavior solutions. By completing the safety action plan, the parishes and municipalities within St. John the Baptist, Tangipahoa, and St. Tammany Parishes will be eligible to apply for implementation funding from the Safe Streets and Roads for All Program.

Public outreach and participation are important elements of the Safety Streets for All grant program. In the coming months, we look forward to engaging with our community to identify social norms and traffic safety issues to address with the help of this grant. This program offers our region a unique opportunity to create a safer, more equitable transportation network for residents of the three-parish region.

Electric Vehicle Infrastructure Update



The Southeast Louisiana Clean Fuel Partnership continues to track updates on the progress of all federal funding that supports Electric Vehicle Infrastructure, including the National Electric Vehicle Infrastructure (NEVI) Formula program. NEVI funds in Louisiana will go through LADOTD with a competitive grants process. The minimum standards and requirements for NEVI were published by FHWA at the end of February. LADOTD still plans to release the application process in 2023. We plan to send out more details when more information is available. Since SLCFP is not involved in the selection process, we plan to assist interested applicants with reviewing grant applications and providing letters of support when applicable. A Notice of Funding Opportunity also been announced for the Charging and Fueling Infrastructure (CFI) Discretionary Grant Program through the US Department of

Transportation. Unlike the NEVI Formula Program, Discretionary Funds are both for community grants and corridor grants. The deadline for applying for discretionary funds will be May 30, 2023, through grants.gov. (include link: <u>Apply Here</u>

RPC Staff Member Highlight - Dr. Li

Dr. Li began his career at RPC in 1994. He is currently the longest serving staff member, and has been an invaluable resource over the span of his career at RPC.

"When I started at RPC, our computing processes were primitive. Things that we take for granted now were very challenging then. We were working in a modular GIS environment on 486's. Our network set ups were very rudimentary- just to send a file to the plotter required a lot of effort. But things are much better now. We have made progress over the years."

Dr. Li received his undergraduate degrees from Nanjing University, and his PhD in Geography from LSU in 1994. His dissertation involved documenting environmental changes in the southern Pearl River Basin.

Over the years, Dr. Li has seen significant changes in the technology of Geospatial Information Systems or GIS. "Much has changed with the technology and computing capacity in this field, but it still takes an experienced person to review outputs and make sense of things."

Dr. Li's primary role at RPC is in a support capacity, assisting other RPC team members on various data analysis and imagery issues- and lending valuable experience and expertise on the subject "I enjoy

helping others here [at RPC]", said Dr. Li. "We use GIS much more frequently and in different ways."

"Dr. Li's knowledge and experience have been invaluable to our organization," said Jeff Roesel, Executive Director. "Dr. Li has helped make our GIS work among the most advanced in the state, especially for an agency our size."

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
